ABSTRACT

The rate of urbanization is increasing exponentially, influencing the environment and wildlife

habitats in metropolitan areas. While urbanization has a major impact on wildlife populations,

some wildlife species still live in cities. This project assessed the distribution and habitat use of

two understudied small mammal species in the greater Washington, D.C. metropolitan area,

eastern cottontails (Sylvilagus floridanus) and woodchucks (Marmota monax). Both species are

considered species of conservation concern in Washington, D.C. However, very little research

has focused on these species in urban environments. The results from this project will support

urban land managers in the implementation of management strategies for these species.
