## **Course Description:**

This course is designed as an introduction to the discipline of geography. Students will gain knowledge on the patterns, problems, prospects of the world's principal human-geographic regions and the role of geographic differences in interpreting world current scene. The course emphasizes a real differentiation, similarities of these world regions and how they interact/interrelate to another in today's globalizing world. The skills and knowledge gained from this course will become the basis for students to ask critical geographic questions about various geographic processes, features, patterns on the landscape at different scales.

## **Expected Learning Outcomes**

Upon completing a Global Contexts course, students will be able to:

- Identify and explain how patterns of global connections across nations and/or cultures have shaped societies to create interdependence and inequality.
- Use a disciplinary lens to demonstrate knowledge of how at least one nation and/or culture participates in or is affected by global contexts.
- Apply an understanding of one's own positionality within a globally interdependent and unequal world to analyze solutions to global problems.
- Compare and contrast different places or regions based on their geographic characteristics.

Mason Core: This course is part of the Mason Core curriculum and fulfills requirements for Global Contexts.

## **Global Contexts**

The Global Contexts (GC) Mason Core requirement is to enable students to explore global connections through a disciplinary lens and to understand how global systems have created both interdependence and inequalities that engaged citizens must understand in order to work toward an equitable and sustainable future.

## **Course Activities**

This course is packed with interactive online pre-work, in-class sessions that'll blow your mind, and post-class activities where you'll team up with awesome classmates. ## Assignments and Evaluation

Students are expected to submit high quality assignments during this course via the Blackboard.

## Map Quizzes & Exercises (150 points)

In these Map Exercise Assignments, students will explore a series of maps and charts that showcase one world region at a time. These resources visually represent geographic information, highlighting both the commonalities (climates, language systems, etc.) within and between regions and the disparities and inequalities that exist. Examples include: Human Development Index scores, carbon emissions, climate vulnerability, social indicators such as average life span of a person in a particular country or region, economic indicators (e.g. GDP) income inequality, gender disparities in education (as measured by mean years of schooling for boys and girls), and global displacement patterns (such as the flows of asylee seekers and refugees from different countries across the globe), environmental indicators (e.g. Carbon footprint, water scarcity, biodiversity loss), etc.

## B. Mastering Geography Assignments (200 points)

• Mastering Geography is an indispensable tool for this geography course. As an online platform, it offers interactive and immersive learning experiences that empower students to grasp geographic concepts and explore diverse locations and topics. By engaging with world-class content, students can develop a deeper understanding of the

interconnectedness of our planet and prepare for success in their academic pursuits and beyond. In addition to the map exercises, you will also complete assignments from this interactive platform.

## C. Examination (400 points)

- Three Exams will be administered. [Exam 1; Mid-Term and Final Exam]
- Exams will comprise of Multiple- Choice-Questions, True/False Questions and Fill-in-the blank questions.
- The final exam date is strictly fixed and cannot be changed for personal reasons. For unexpected emergencies, contact the instructor immediately for potential accommodations.
  - EXAM I & Mid Term (100 points each) = 200 Points
  - Final Exam [200 points] NO MAKEUP EXAMS will be given without supporting documents.

## D. Final Group Presentation on Global Context [150 points]

- By the end of the semester, you will demonstrate your understanding of global context through a group project. Working in teams of five, you will receive detailed instructions via Blackboard. Your task is to select one of the following global issues:
  - Climate change, Global inequality, Migration patterns, or Globalization and cultural exchange. Research and analyze the issue from a regional perspective, considering its manifestations, causes, consequences, interconnections, and potential solutions.
  - Create a 10-minute presentation that effectively communicates your findings, including a clear introduction, detailed analysis, discussion of interconnections, and a conclusion with recommendations

## E. In-class activities, small group discussion and Participation - 100 points

• This will involve students engaging in short, group discussions, Kahoot Games guided by the LA, etc. [Easy grade to get – show your willingness to learn!]

## Late/Make-up Assignments Policy
