Map Quizzes: There will be a map quiz per each region of the week. Students are expected to first study and memorize each regional countries before taking the quiz. The quizzes will consist of short answers and/or multiple choice worth 6% total of the semester grade.

Final Project: The Final Project will be worth 27 points total. The project will be an individual itinerary project. The topic country will be chosen by the student limited to **Europe or Asia**. Further instructions will follow on Blackboard under Syllabus & Docs. 2 points will be dedicated to Final Project Step 1 & 2, which will be assigned early in the semester. Submit as a word file.
