Course Description:

Patterns, problems, and prospects of the world's principal human-geographic regions. Emphasizes areal differentiation and role of geographic differences in interpreting current world scene. **Course Prerequisites:** None

Mason Core:

This course is part of the Mason Core curriculum and fulfills requirements for Global Contexts. Mason Core is Mason's general education program that builds the foundation for the Mason Graduate – an engaged citizen and well-rounded scholar who is prepared to act. Mason Core is a set of required courses that create the foundation of a student's undergraduate degree. It provides a breadth of liberal education courses, complementing the depth of knowledge and skills students build in their majors and minors. All undergraduates seeking a baccalaureate degree must complete

Mason Core requirements. Mason Core prepares students for work in their majors and minors, for their careers, and for life-long learning. Foundation courses build key knowledge and skills needed for academic success. Exploration courses provide a breadth of learning across the university. Integration courses include upper-division courses that are designed to integrate knowledge and skills learned from Foundation and Exploration courses into the major. Courses are designed around learning outcomes that help develop the qualities we expect of all students graduating with a Bachelor's degree from George Mason University.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon completing a Global Contexts course, students will be able to:

1. Identify and explain how patterns of global connections across nations and/or cultures have shaped societies to create interdependence and inequality.

2. Use a disciplinary lens to demonstrate knowledge of how at least one nation and/or culture participates in or is affected by global contexts.

3. Apply an understanding of one's own positionality within a globally interdependent and unequal world to analyze solutions to global problems.

Map Quizzes: There will be a map quiz per each region of the week. Students are expected to first study and memorize each regional countries before taking the quiz. The quizzes will consist of short answers and/or multiple choice worth 6% total of the semester grade.

HW Assignments: There will be 3 HW Exercise assignments worth 4 points each. Submit as a word file.

Discussion Board: The Discussion Board will take place on Blackboard in essay format. Each Discussion will be worth 5 points with a total of 3 discussions. 3 points will be towards the Discussion essay. Format: 750 words minimum, double spaced, and at least 2 references.

You can attach a word file or write directly on the discussion. 2 points are dedicated towards replying to 2 peers. The reply must be at least 4 sentences and directly discuss something from that person's essay.

Final Project: The Final Project will be worth 27 points total. The project will be an individual itinerary project. The topic country will be chosen by the student limited to **Europe or Asia**. Cannot choose the example (Italy). Further instructions will follow on Blackboard under Syllabus & Docs. 2 points will be dedicated to Final Project Step 1 & 2, which will be assigned early in the semester. Submit as a word file.
