### **COURSE DESCRIPTION (3 credits)**

This course provides a survey of cultural, physical, and societal aspects of major world regions. We will examine how forces across various scales, from local to global, shape the character of place and space. Furthermore, we will explore how regions differ from one another, are similar to one another, and interact with/interrelate to one another in today's globalizing world. Acquiring a familiarity with and a foundation in the geography of the major world regions allows us to ask more critical questions about the unevenness of various geographical processes and patterns on the landscape in addition to reflecting on our own role in the larger world.

# MAPPING EXERCISES (250 pts, 25%)

There are 2 mapping exercises which include labeling countries and geographical features on maps and additional questions about regions. Mapping exercises are not timed.

# ASSIGNMENTS (250 pts, 25%)

There are 2 homework assignments; the first is a worksheet style assignment and the second is a map where you chart and explain a geographical pattern of your choosing.

#### **EXAMS (500 pts. 50%)**

There is a midterm and a final. Exams are administered via BB and do NOT use Respondus lockdown browser. Exams are a mix of multiple choice, true/false, fill in the blank, short answer, and short essay. The final exam is comprehensive, but over 50% of questions pertain to material covered since the midterm. Content is derived from all learning materials pertaining to each week. Take the exam after you have engaged with *all* of the learning materials.

\*NOTE: Exams, assignments, and mapping exercises are open resource, meaning you can use resources on the BB site, books, notes, etc to help you complete them, but you must abide by the GMU Honor Code by completing them individually without collaborating with anyone in any way. See the Academic Integrity section.

\*NOTE: You are responsible for proper and timely submission of all graded work; check email for submission receipt and check BB to be sure your submission appears correctly. If you cannot submit via BB, you MUST email the item to the professor <u>before</u> it is due. If you encounter errors during exams, take screenshots with timestamps and email professor.

#### LATE WORK POLICY

Each student starts with 2 late work tokens, which allow you to turn in a graded item up to 48 hours past the original due date without penalty. When using a late token, you do NOT need to email the professor in advance; simply turn in/complete your item on BB as usual.

# Examples:


