Course Description

This 3-credit course provides an overview of the subfield of human geography called political geography. Subtopics surveyed include state formation, social movements, environmental injustice, etc. Theory foundational to political geography in addition to an array of other social sciences will be discussed alongside historical and contemporary case studies. Special attention is paid to the unevenness of power at various scales as expressed through Politics/politics. This course satisfies the Mason Core Social and Behavioral Sciences Requirement.

You must complete 7 Reading Responses (RR), which are one page (at least 300 words) double spaced where you summarize the key content and argument of the scholarly reading assigned for the week. Make connections between readings/topics than span units and/or relate to outside events. At least 3 RR must be completed prior to Spring Break.

300 pts, 30%

Exams

There are 2 exams (exam 2 is not cumulative). Exams occur in person during class time. Format is a mix of short answer, fill in/definition, T/F, multiple choice.
